Are financial problems common?

Evidence suggests that more and more people are falling behind with their debt repayments. Too many people are burying their heads in the sand and hoping that their problems will disappear. People need to take action sooner rather than later.

What are the consequences of failing to tackle debt?

The consequences can be serious. For example, arrears on any loan secured against property may result in action to repossess your home. The Financial Services Authority has reported that home repossessions have risen significantly since last year.

What advice is available?
